#### Yellow Flag Iris

Yellow flag iris has begun to establish itself along properties along the edge of the lake shore. The flowers are lovely and property owners may enjoy seeing them in bloom but the iris is a noxious and invasive weed that is listed by the State of Washington as a class C weed and should not be allowed to get a foothold wherever you see it

The weed is very difficult to remove once established – requiring both labor intensive physical removal and or chemical treatment to eradicate. The resin on the leaves is also an irritant which may cause a skin rash on you or any of your guests that come in contact with it. The resin also adds to the difficulty of removal.

Please, if you see any Yellow Flag Iris on your property, remove it immediately before it gets established. Infestations can become severe and if ignored, can cover your entire shoreline.

## Trees Make A Difference

#### TREES

BY JOYCE KILMER I think that I shall never see A poem lovely as a tree.

A tree whose hungry mouth is prest Against the earth's sweet flowing breast;

A tree that looks at God all day, And lifts her leafy arms to pray;

A tree that may in Summer wear A nest of robins in her hair;

Upon whose bosom snow has lain; Who intimately lives with rain.

Poems are made by fools like me, But only God can make a tree.

ROOF MOSS CONTROL - Nobody wants moss on their roof. It can hold moisture, causing leaks and serious damage. Yet many moss removal treatments can harm our environment and waterways. Follow the tips below to help prevent and treat roof moss in an environmentally friendly way.

#### Low-chemical removal:

- Newly established patches can sometimes be removed with gentle wet sweeping or a leaf blower.
- In the summer, try sprinkling powdered dish or laundry detergent on mosscovered areas. Wait three or four days and remove moss with a broom or brush.

#### Chemical removal:

- If you use moss control products, choose from the safer options that are available.
   Look for products containing soaps, fatty acids or ferrous sulfate which are less toxic and designed to protect the environment.
- Avoid products containing copper, zinc and iron sulfate. These substances can pollute our lake and are toxic to aquatic animals.

#### Prevent runoff:

 Don't allow moss control products or contaminated rinse water to run into a storm drain or into the street, where it will drain to the lake.



## ENVIRONMENTAL BENEFITS <u>Pollution Interception</u>: Help to improve air quality

<u>Carbon Sequestration</u>: Trees absorb carbon dioxide, strew the carbon in the wood and release oxygen we breathe.

<u>Fuel Use</u>: Trees can reduce the use of fuel for heating and cooling. Trees provide shelter and reduce windspeed, thus reducing heat loss from buildings during winter. They also provide shade in the summer, and provide cooling in the summer.

<u>Noise Reduction</u>: Trees can pay an important role in attenuating noise through reflecting and absorbing sound energy.

Hydrology: Trees can reduce erosion and improve water quality through the interception of pollution. Trees can also reduce groundwater runoff. Other Benefits: Shade cast on road surfaces can significantly increase the life of a road by reducing the surface temperatures during hot weather.

## A maintained septic system keeps you and the environment healthy and helps:

- Reduce the risk of people getting sick from untreated sewage.
- Reduce the risk of contaminating groundwater and surface water.
- Save you money and extend the life of your system.

## finalthoughts...

The members of LMBC enjoy non-motorized boating, fishing, swimming, and a beach with a pavilion, restrooms and a playground. This is why we live here!



Lake Minterwood itself has roughly 20 acres for use for the members enjoyment. It is stocked with Rainbow Trout, two or three times a year depending on budget and need. To ensure the health continues for those who swim in the lake it is monitored monthly, from May through September for bacterial contamination.

#### Lake Level

Since the mid-70's the LMBC trustees have dealt with continual seepage and water loss from the lake. There have been various studies trying to find the source of any loss and at least one attempt to plug any leaks with grout. Over the past years the lake level has averaged the same with adequate rainfall and input from our well.

#### The Well

Sometime in the early 80's the LMBC drilled and installed our well that discharges into the lake. The lake is continually supplemented and replenished during the spring and summer months with the well water.

#### Algae Blooms

Over the last few years, the lake has undergone occasional rapid growth (often referred to as a bloom) of blue-green algae. These types of algae can have toxins associated with them when present in large amounts. It is not a concern unless it has accumulated to visibly noticeable levels often described as a scum or paint. When detected, members and Pierce County are informed. Pierce County no longer budgets to monitor blooms for us, so LMBC Trustee members collect samples and send them in for analysis.

## To help keep nutrients causing blooms out of our lake be aware of the following:

1. Septic Systems. A poorly maintained septic system can drain, not only nutrients but also harmful bacteria into the watershed and into the lake. Frequent inspections, repair and pumping are necessary not only for the health of you and your family, but the health of the reservoir as well.

- Clean up after your pets. Dog poo can be a major source of the nutrient loading in a lake. Please pick up after your dog. The LMBC provides poo bags for you to use at both the beach club and the Dam (113<sup>th</sup> crossing) end of the lake.
- 3. Chemical fertilizers. The NPK that is listed on the bags of chemical fertilizers are also perfect for the algae. Be careful if you use chemical fertilizers, make sure it is well mixed into the soil and please don't apply during periods of heavy rain.

#### Some Fishing Rules & Reminders

The lake was last stocked before Labor Day weekend. Limit is four fish per day per authorized fisherman. Each authorized fisherman is allowed one pole at a time. Catch and release fishing is encouraged. The State requires fishing licenses on Lake Minterwood.

Remember – fishing in Lake Minterwood is for members and guests only. Only members with current member identification cards have fishing privileges. Each lot owner is allowed a maximum of 4 fishing guests at any one time. More fishing guests will require fishing passes. Members must accompany their fishing guests.

#### Windsailing and Tree Topping Guidelines

As the winter and windy time of year approaches, members are reminded of guidelines for trimming or windsailing their trees in preparation. A number of years ago the Board of Trustees adopted the guidelines below that more precisely define the meaning of windsailing trees and topping trees so there will be no misunderstanding as to what is meant by each.

- 1. Windsailing includes removing dead branches, thinning branches, and balancing a tree by trimming branches.
- Windsailing does NOT include topping a tree (i.e., cutting off the main stem of the tree)
  Arborists discourage topping trees because the procedure can hasten disease and death of the
  tree.
- 3. Windsailing does not require ACC approval. Topping a tree DOES require ACC approval, and the cut must be properly treated.
- 4. CONTACT ACC before any work is done if you have any questions about windsailing or topping.
